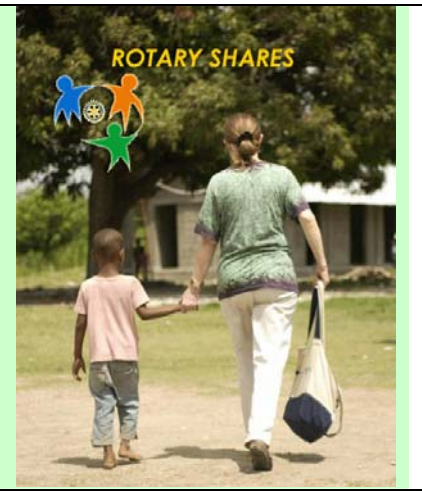

If you think it is dry in Guilford County take a look at the Food Banks around the area. The

Deep River Rotary Club has identified what they hope to be a signature project: **The Southern Triad Missions Inc. – Food Pantry of the Ward Street Mission Church**. Once a month members of Deep River Rotary provide staffing at the Food Pantry. Last week they were told that they would not be needed to staff the program because the cupboard was bare! At the same time, our Joe Hellinger suggested and is implementing a canned food drive. When Joe asked if there were any suggestions as to which food bank we might support, the **Deep River Rotary Club's** project came to mind. So, unless there is strong feeling that another pantry should be supported, food collected at our meetings will find its way to the Ward Street program subject to board approval. Here are suggestions for items needed that have been prepared by the Ward Street Mission.

HELP FEED THE HUNGRY WHEN YOU SHOP!

- Pinto, white, pork & beans 2 cans
- Green beans 2 cans
- Corn 2 cans
- Canned tomatoes 2 cans
- Tomato soup 2 cans
- Chicken noodle soup 2 cans
- Beef stew, chili, etc. 1 lb.
- Tuna, salmon 2 cans
- Fruit, applesauce 2 cans
- Peanut butter 18 oz. jar
- Dry beans (bag) 1 lb.
- Rice 1 lb.
- Dry milk 1 box
- Oatmeal 18 oz.
- Macaroni & cheese 1 box

Rotary's Wheel Emblem

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon

wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association." A group of engineers advised that the gear wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem.
