From the files of the High Point Police Department –

On January 2, 2009 at 9:40pm officers responded to the Piedmont Christian Home in reference to a missing seventy-four year old female that was in the advanced stages of dementia. Home personnel told the officers that they had search the building and ground but had not located the female. Officers formulated a search plan that included a K-9 and started looking. Once the K-9 was in place, it did not take long before the K-9 was on the trail of the missing person. After a short time period had elapsed, the K-9 lead officers to the missing female. When officers checked the victim, she was extremely cold and unconscious. In an attempt to warm the victim, several officers took off their heavy winter jackets and covered the female. One officer even removed his toboggan and put it on her head. The area in which the female was located was down a steep, heavily wooded embankment. The outdoor temperature at the time she was found was about 30 degrees. Due to the area in which she was found, she would first have to be removed from the woods before medical treatment could be administered. The officers took several blankets and made a make shift stretcher. They then carefully put the victim on the blankets and made the 150 yard journey to the waiting paramedics.

According to medical personnel at the hospital, the victim was suffering from hyperthermia and could not have survived much longer. There was little to no chance she could have survived the night.

Due to the actions of K-9 Officer **Terence Garrison**, his dog "Bart" and Officer **Leland Neilson**, Chief Fealy presented both officers with the department's "Life Saving Award". In addition, six other officers were issued Departmental Commendations for their part in the rescue.

The victim spent two days in the hospital and is not recovering at home. She is expected to make a full recovery.

From Chief David Taylor, High Point Fire Department – Firefighter Eric Stoud (sorry no photo) of the High Point Fire Department was selected as one of its Heroes. Firefighter Stoud received this award primarily because he, free of compensation and ceremony, has demonstrated the highest degree of commitment to his department and profession through his assistance to the Training Division of the fire department. Firefighter Stoud is a highly motivated professional who shares his time (both on and off duty), resources, training props, knowledge, skills and abilities with the members of his department. This 9 year veteran is a Firefighter, Fire Equipment Operator, EMT, Certified Rescue Specialist, Certified Fire Service Instructor and member of the Technical Rescue Team whose responsibilities include high level, ropes, confined space and building collapse emergencies. His performance and leadership are consistent with the high standards and goals of the High Point Fire Department.

Congratulate ASHLEY STOUT who recently received her MBA degree from High Point University. I guess Ashley is the Student of the Month, or at least she should be.
